TITLE I

Checklist for LEA Plans

To receive funds under Title I, Part A, a LEA must submit a plan that:

- A. is coordinated with other programs under IASA, Goals 2000, and other appropriate Acts;
- B. is approved by the SEA;
- C. may be part of a consolidated application

Each plan must:

- A. be developed in consultation with teachers, pupil services personnel, and parents;
- B. meet State standards:
- C. include professional development activities consistent with Sec. 1119;
- D. reflect shared responsibility of schools, teachers, and the LEA in making decisions about participating schools;
- E. be filed according to SEA schedule;
- F. receive provisional approval by SEA in one (1) year;
- G. receive final approval within two (2) years;
- H. periodically be reviewed and revised, as necessary, but otherwise will remain in effect for the duration of the LEA's participation under Title I, Part A.

Each plan must include <u>descriptions</u> of:

- A. any high-quality assessments the LEA and school will use in addition to those in the state Plan to
 - 1. determine the success of children;
 - 2. provide information to teachers, parents, and students on progress;
 - 3. assist in diagnosis, teaching, and learning;
 - 4. determine what program revisions are needed to meet the State's performance standards;
- B. any other assessment indicators the LEA chooses to use;
- C. the <u>strategy</u> that will be used to provide professional development for teachers, pupil service personnel, administrators, parents, and other staff (consistent with Sec. 1119);
- D. the coordination and integration of services with other educational services, such as Even Start, Head Start, Vocational Ed, and School-to-Work;
- E. the coordination and integration with programs to eliminate duplication, reduce fragmentation, and increase effectiveness for LEP, disabled, migrant, N or D, homeless, or immigrant children;
- F. the poverty criteria that will be used to select school attendance areas;

- G. how teachers, parents, administrators, and pupil services personnel in targeted assistance school will identify the eligible children most in need of services;
- H. the <u>nature</u> of schoolwide programs and programs in targeted assistance schools:
- I. the nature of services to N or D and homeless children;
- J. how eligible migrant and formerly migrant children will be selected on the same basis as others;
- K. how Title I dollars will support preschool programs, particularly Head Start or Even Start programs.

The LEA plan must also <u>incorporate</u> – the written parent involvement policy developed under Sec. 1118

The LEA plan must also include <u>assurances</u> that it will:

- A. inform eligible schools and parents of schoolwide project authority;
- B. provide technical assistance and support to schoolwide programs;
- C. work in consultation with schools developing and implementing schools' plans so there is adequate yearly progress;
- D. fulfill the school improvement responsibilities of all LEA's (pursuant to Sec. 1116);
- E. to the extent feasible, as decided by the LEA, coordinate and collaborate with other agencies that provide services to children, youth, and families, including health and social services;
- F. provide services to eligible private school students and timely, meaningful consultation with private school officials regarding such services (pursuant to Sec. 1220);
- G. consider model programs and research that says services may be more effective in earlier grades;
- H. ensure preschool programs comply with Head Start performance standards.
